# **Constitutional Amendment Approved by Tribal Voters**

Sac and Fox Nation voters on January 4, 2020 approved an amendment to the Constitution of the Sac and Fox Nation in a Secretarial Election. The election was authorized by the United States Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), after the Sac and Fox Nation Business Committee approved and sum itted Resolution Numb r SF-19-244, which requested the election.

The constitutional amendment pertains to memb rship of the tribe, and was ratified by a vote of 15 for, and 8 against. approved amendment The states:

"Persons br n after the date of Octob r 16 194, who possess one-eighth (1% or more Sac and Fox Indian b ood, at least one of whose parents is a member of the Sac and Fox Nation, shall **b** entitled to mem**b** rship with the Sac and Fox Nation, provided an application is sub itted in writing to the Sac and Fox Nation, and provided that such person, if enrolled with another tribe, shall first file a conditional relinquishment with the other

Voting on a Constitutional amendment is different from a Trib l election. Only adult trib al memb rs who were 18 years or older on the date of the Secretarial Election, and, registered with the U. S. Secretary of the Interior, were entitled to vote on the ratification or rejection of the proposed amendment. Registering and voting were done by m ail, not in person.

The Secretarial Election Board was comprised of BIA officials Sherry Lovin and Andrea Phillips, and Sac and Fox trib 1 memb rs Gwen Wilbr n and Peggy Big Eagle.

Prior to the election, ba rd memb r Peggy Big Eagle said the amendment was needed b cause, in the memb rship article of the Sac and Fox Constitution, Article I, Section & e) it does not clearly state and require that an applicant have a parent on the roll. In the past, every applicant has **b** en required to have a parent on the roll. But, unfortunately, there was an incident where an applicant was denied memb rship b cause no parent was on the roll. However, she won in trib 1 court, allowing the applicant to enroll.

The constitutional amendment **b** came effective immediately. The election guidelines required at least thirty percent (0%) of the 43 registered voters cast their **b** llots for or against the proposed amendment.







# Sac and Fox Nation Education Department News

Greetings!!

The Education Department has been very busy with the Spring 2020 Higher Education applications. We are working on getting all documents to the colleges, universities, and vocational schools in a timely matter. If there is a delay, more than likely we had to call applicants for missing documents to complete the application.

Education Specialist Jean Lynam, of the Sac and Fox Nation Education Department, does an outstanding job of processing everyone's applications for higher education and also for the J.O.M. students that attend public schools in the jurisdictional service area.

We service the following public schools with our J.O.M. funding: Agra Public School, Chandler Public School, Cushing Public School, Davenport Public School, Grove Public School, Jim Thor-

pe Academy (Shawnee), Meeker Public School, North Rock Creek School, Oak Grove Elementary School (Cushing), Pleasant Grove Public School, Prague Public School, Ripley Public School, Shawnee Public School and Stroud Public School.

My plans are to visit each of the schools. We plan on being more involved in the schools with their Indian Parent Committee, and if a school does not have an active parent committee, we would like to help in forming one. I feel that every public school should have an active Indian Parent Committee so that the parents, grandparent or guardians of students know what is going on in their student's school.

As I mentioned in the January Sac and Fox Newsletter, the Every Student Succeeds Act emphasizes that public schools are required to have a consultation with

Tribal Leaders of how federal dollars are spent in school. That is why there needs to be a strong active Indian Parent Committee in the public schools.

On January 7, 2020, I had scheduled a physical visit to the Prague Public School and met with Jennifer Smith, Principal and Stephanie Lee, High School Counselor. Not present was Mike Hedge, Federal Programs Administrator. The purpose of the meeting was to introduce myself as the Education Director of the Sac and Fox Nation, to get a better view of what they have in their curriculum in light of American Indian Studies, and what activities are offered for our American Indian Students that attend school there. Prague Public School has 261 American Indian Students with 7 being Sac and Fox Tribal members. We had a discussion of the Sac and Fox Education Department being present at the beginning of the school year to take J.O.M. applications. We are in hopes that there will be a better open communication of services for both school and tribe.

The education department is working with other departments here at the Nation to implement some activities in the near future. We will keep you informed as plans lay out.

We would like to introduce two of our Sac and Fox higher education students: Sarah Grace Osman is majoring in Plant Biology with Math minor. She is attending Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Oklahoma. Sarah is in her second year at OSU; and, Michael Osman, majoring in Illustration at Arcadia University, Glenside, Pennsylvania. Michael is in his first year at Arcadia University.

It is nice to see and talk to our Sac and Fox students when they stop by the office. We are proud of Sarah and Michael for furthering their education, and also proud of all the students that are attending college and university. KEEP UP THE DEDICATION!!!

# Data Show 4.2% Decrease in Beef Exports

Recently released data show a 4.2 percent year-over-year decrease in beef exports for the first 10 months of 2019, following three years of double-digit year-over-year growth in total beef exports.

"Beef exports were down 9 percent in October compared to last year, with 2019 beef exports to date declining in four of the top five U.S. beef export markets," said Derrell Peel, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock marketing specialist.

Total beef imports increased 2.7 percent year over year in October and were up 0.7 percent for the year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Beef exports to Japan, the largest U.S. beef export destination, decreased 23.5 percent in October and were down 10.6 percent year over year in 2019. The United States has been at a significant tariff disadvantage in Japan after withdrawing from the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TTP) agreement.

"The impacts of TPP, which took effect this year without the United States, have become increasingly apparent in recent months as beef exports to Japan have decreased year over year for the last eight months," Peel said. Peel added the bilateral trade deal between the United States and Japan that is scheduled to begin in 2020 will hopefully erase most of the tariff disadvantage America currently faces and will stop the erosion of beef market share in Japan.

Japan represents 26.7 percent of U.S. beef exports for the year to date in 2019. South Korea is the second-largest beef export market and is up 7.4 percent for 2019 but declined 1.2 percent in October compared to one year ago. South Korea accounts for 22.8 percent of total U.S. beef exports thus far in 2019.

Mexico is the third-largest beef export market, as well as the third-largest source of U.S. beef imports. Beef exports to Mexico were down 11.5 percent in October and declined 3.5 percent for the year to date. Mexico accounts for 14.3 percent of beef exports thus far in 2019. Beef imports from Mexico were up 19.6 percent year over year in October and are up 14.1 percent for the year to date in 2019. Mexico currently accounts for 18.7 percent of U.S. beef imports.

Canada is the fourth-largest U.S. beef export market and is currently the largest beef import market. Beef exports to Canada decreased 4.5 percent in October compared to last year and were down 11.3 percent in 2019. Canada represents 8.8 percent of beef exports for 2019. Beef imports from Canada increased 8.9 percent in October and were up 8 percent year over year for the first 10 months of 2019. Beef imports from Canada are 27.7 percent of total beef imports for the year to date.

Hong Kong, the fifth-largest beef export market, is down 11.1 percent year over year in October and down 27.5 percent for 2019. Hong Kong represents 6.9 percent of total beef exports. Close behind Hong Kong is Taiwan where beef exports decreased 8.7 percent in October but are up 7.8 percent for the year to date.

"Taiwan is the sixth-largest beef export market for U.S. beef and accounts for 6.5 percent of year-to-date exports," Peel said. Australia is the second-largest beef import source for the United States, with imports down 7.1 percent in October and up 4.1 percent for the year to date. Australia accounts for 23.1 percent of American beef imports in 2019. New Zealand is the fourth-largest beef import market for American product, with October imports down 37.9 percent and imports down 28.8 percent. Oklahoma is America's second-leading producer of beef cows, according to USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service data.

# **ENBRIDGE Grant to Establish Pollination Plots for Monarch Butterflies**

The Sac and Fox Nation will use a \$0,00 0 grant from Enb idge Energy to estab ish pollination plots to serve as part of a migration route for the monarch bt terfly and other key insects. The grant was presented to tribal officials by Enb idge Senior Community Engagement Advisor Brent Rush and other Enb idge representatives on Jan 15 in the Sac and Fox Nation Learning Center. The presentation was made during a meeting of the North Central Oklahoma Chapter of the Indian Chamber of Commerce.

The grant funds will **b** used to develop and create a decorative layout of islands of pollination plots that will serve as part of a migration route for the monarch butterfly. The pollination plots will also serve as a hands-on classroom to educate trib 1 memb rs and the general pub ic abut the importance of the role that monarch butterflies and other insect pollinators have in assisting in the pollination of 80% of the world's flowering plants.

The declining monarch population parallels other declining pollinator populations, which in turn, impacts human food systems. Providing habitat, like milkweed, for monarchs is essential in maintaining a **b** lanced food web within the ecosystems that are critical in sustaining humans. The location of the pollination plots is to b on Sac and Fox land that in years passed was littered with oil

# Tips Offered to Help **Keep Heating Bills Under Control**

Temperatures in Oklahoma often can sink below freezing. While keeping your home warm is a priority, so is keeping down the cost of your utility bill. Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist, said there are free things homeowners and renters can do to help keep heating costs from going through the roof.

"Heating bills can really put a strain on your wallet during the winter months, so it's important to take advantage of some cost-saving tips," Peek said. "You should see a change in your heating b ll after implementing these tips."

The easiest thing that you can do is to turn the thermostat down when you go to work or leave the home for extended periods of time. You do not want to pay for heat that you are not home to enjoy. Also, turn down the heat a few degrees when you go to bed.

"When you return home, set the thermostat to the lowest, comfortable setting. For every degree you lower the thermostat, consumers can save abut 3 percent on heating costs. Also, instead of turning up the heat if you get chilly, dress for the weather. Wear warm clothes, including a sweater and socks, around the house and add an extra blanket to your bed," Peek said. "To help keep your heat set where it should be, make sure you lower it when you leave for work and raise it up a bit when you return home."

Sunlight, even in the winter, is a way to add natural, free warmth to your home. Open your b inds and curtains to let the sun stream through the windows, particularly on south-facing walls. As the sun sets, close them to help keep trap that warmth inside. Peek said make certain that heat is not escaping from your home.

"Be sure doors and windows are closed tight. Check to make sure your fireplace isn't letting air enter and escape your home. Obviously, a roaring fire in the fireplace creates a space of warmth and comfort in your home, bt it also can b a source of air leaks. When not in use, keep the damper closed to help prevent cold air from coming in and warm air from escaping," she said. "If your fireplace has doors, keep them closed when there isn't a fire burning. You should definitely see some extra money in your pocket throughout the winter season."

Prescriptions for mailing must be requested through the BHHC Pharmacy Refill Line and require a 7-day advance notice.

The Pharmacy will only mail to the address listed in the health record of the patient. It is the patient's responsibility to keep their address up to date.



# Water Tower Lighting System Installed; Spotlights Seal for Highway Passersby

Project Manager Truman Carter recently announced the completed installation of a lighting system for the Sac and Fox Nation water storage tower. The lighting system is comprised of two 400-watt, 30-degree angle beam (over 64,000 lumen) lights mounted on steel street racks. One of the angle beams is visible in the foreground. A 20-amp breaker and a 120-volt photo cell control the dusk-to-dawn lighting. The beams are directed to highlight the tribal seal near the top of the tower, making it visible at night from Hwy. 99/377. (Photo by Mike Brown)
