Tony Tiger Among Seven Artists Featured In 'MVSKOKE VOICES' Museum Art Show

'MVSKOKE VOICES,' Contempr ary Native American Art, is open to the public at the Seminole Nation Museum in Wewoka, Okla. following a delayed Wesley (Muscogee Creek). opening date due to COVID-19 concerns. The first-ever joint exhibition by the Seminole Nation Museum and Red Earth Art Center features seven of Oklahoma's most talented Seminole and Muscogee (Creek) artists in an invitational art show open free to the public through August 22. An Artist's Reception is scheduled Saturday, Aug 15 from 2-4 pm at the museum.

For over 40 years the Red Earth Art Center in Oklahoma City and the Seminole Nation Museum in Wewoka have worked to achieve their similar missions to share the history and traditions of American Indian arts and cultures through a combination of ethnological programming, educational outreach, art exhibitions and award-winning Festivals.

The Seminole Nation Museum and Red Earth Art Center have collaborated to create a contemporary art exhibition that celebrates artists of Muscogee (Creek) and Seminole origins. Those who share the MVSKOKE language also share a deep connection through their extraordinary history and cultural traditions.

MVSKOKE VOICES Contempr ary Native American Art features beautiful examples of Seminole and Muscogee (Creek) paintings, screen prints, textiles and sculpture pieces. The invitation art show includes the original art of award-winning artists Leslie A. Deer (Muscogee Creek), Enoch Kelly Haney (Seminole), Benjamin Harjo, Jr (Absentee Shawnee/ Seminole), Bobby C. Martin (Muscogee Creek), Dana Tiger (Muscogee Creek), Tony Tiger (Muscogee Creek/Sac & Fox/ Seminole), and the late Tillier Now Through Aug. 22 In Wewoka, Okla.

The Seminole Nation Museum was constructed in 1937 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA) to serve as the Wewoka Community Center. Today, the museum has hosted over a half-million visitors representing every US State and over 100 foreign countries since opening nearly five decades ago. It has more than doubled in size to include 4000 square feet of display space, a research library, and expanded arts and crafts center and an art gallery that regularly hosts special and national traveling exhibits.

Situated on the entire 500 block of South Wewoka Avenue (Main Street) near downtown Wewoka, this big time museum in a small town is 69 miles east of Oklahoma City just south of I-40. The museum's campus is situated on land located in both the Seminole Nation of Oklahoma and the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. All agree the Seminole Nation Museum is special to the 3,189 residents who call Wewoka home.

In June 2019, the Red Earth Art Center reached an agreement with BancFirst that relocated the small, yet active art center to the ground floor lobby of the BancFirst Tower in downtown Oklahoma City. BancFirst recently purchased the 36-story building formerly known as Cotter Ranch Tower and construction crews are currently working on ex ensive renovations to the downtown landmark.

Plans call for the Red Earth Art Center to reopen to the public in 2021 with a full schedule of art exhibitions featuring area artists in addition to the notable Red Earth permanent collection of fine art including paintings, sculpture, pottery, basketry and

the renowned Deupree Cradleboard Collection, considered the largest collection of its kind in the southwest.

A major component of the downtown Oklahoma City Red Earth Art Center will continue to be a sales gallery featuring both contemporary and traditional original Native artwork from local and regional artists. A mission of the non-profit organization is to provide Native artists a vehicle to sell their art to the public.

Both museums are noted for their award-winning marquis events. The Seminole Nation Museum founded and co-sponsors the annual Wewoka Sorghum Festival - swelling the population of the community tenfold on the fourth Saturday of October. The annual Red Earth Festival attracts thousands from throughout the globe each

Announced by Tribal Officials

57th Annual Sac and Fox Nation **Powwow Canceled Due to Virus**

On May 3 the Sac and Fox Nation announced the difficult decision was made to cancel the 57th Annual Sac and Fox Nation Powwow. The event, scheduled for July 9 -12, 2020, has been canceled due to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

The Sac and Fox Nation Business Committee made the decision to cancel the annual event after closely monitoring the coronavirus outbreak and recommendations from public health experts.

The process has been a continuing conversation; the Powwow Committee also monitored the developments and recommended the cancellation of this year's event. The logistics and extra precautions that would need to be in place this year make the event unmanageable.

"It's with a heavy heart that we announce this decision. We understand the gravity of the situation for our families, vendors, and guests. The Sac and Fox Nation Powwow is an impr tant tradition with a history of excellence," said Principal Chief Justin F. Wood. "We know this is more than an event. It's a celebration of culture, family, and connection. But we can't sacrifice the health of our tribal members and community. We are disappointed, but remain confident we will get through this difficult time together."

Chief Wood emphasized the Sac and Fox Nation Powwow will return better than ever in 2021. "I encourage everyone to make plans to join us next year for the 2021 Sac and Fox Nation Powwow."

The 2021 Sac and Fox Nation Powwow is scheduled for July 8-11, 2021 and is open to the public. The event will be held at Jim Thorpe Memorial Park, located near the Sac and Fox Nation's Capitol Complex, five miles south of Stroud, Okla.

Sac and Fox Nation Receives a **Second CARES Distribution**

The Sac and Fox Nation Business Committee announced June 15 that the Sac and Fox Nation received a second distribution from the Coronavirus Relief Fund in the amount of \$2,879,457.81.

As of June 15, 2020, the Sac and Fox Nation has received a total of \$24,197,685.70 from the Coronavirus Relief Fund. The Sac and Fox Nation received an initial distribution from the Coronavirus Relief Fund of \$21,318,227.90 on May 19, 2020.

Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act established the \$150 Billion Coronavirus Relief Fund. The U. S. Treasury is responsible for making payments from the Coronavirus Relief Fund to tribal governments. The Sac and Fox Nation applied for the funds and submitted the required documentation to receive the funds.

The allocation methodology was determined by the U. S. Treasury. The U.S. Treasury announced it has retained funds for Alaska Native corporations pending litigation on the matter. Further, the U. S. Treasury announced it has "retained a pr tion of the amounts set aside for tribal governments, which

will be available to resolve any potentially adverse decision in litigation." The Sac and Fox Nation Business Committee is working with all of the departments to finalize allocation of the funds in accordance with the guidance released by the U. S. Treasury.

History Center Offering 'Vernacular' Photo Exhibit of Oklahoma Life

Beginning June 15, the Oklahoma History Center is offering a new photographic exhibit entitled "In the Vernacular: Everyday Images of Oklahoma Life," which celebrates everyday image-making. The exhibit is expected to run for approximately one year, and is composed of 36 black-and-white and color images curated from the Oklahoma Historical Society's photographic collections.

It features fun, quirky and sometimes odd images of Oklahomans. The photos were taken for a variety of purposes, including souvenir postcards, government archives, police case files, pin-up posters, networking websites, magazines, newspapers and family albums.

Vernacular photography is a genre comprised of family and professional studio portraits as well as casual snapshots. These images are usually created by amateur photographers for documenting personal history.

In the book "African American Vernacular Photography," Brian Wallis, curator of the Walther Collection, describes the genre as "banal photographs, often recorded by the most ordinary photographers, small-town studio operators, professional photographers on assignment, dads with cameras in the backyard." According to Wallis, these images "belie no apparent aesthetic ambition other than to record what p sses in front of their camera with reasonable fidelity."

The exhibit is on display in the Chesapeake Event Center and Gallery, which also is utilized for meetings and events. Patrons should call in advance to make sure the exhibit is open to the public during the time of their visit. The Oklahoma History Center is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is located at 800 Nazih Zuhdi Drive in Oklahoma City. National Parks Benefit U. S. and Local Economies \$41.7 Billion

U.S. Secretary of the Interior David L. Bernhardt on June 11 announced the annual economic benefit of national parks to the U.S. and local economies. In 2019, visitor spending in communities near national parks resulted in a \$41.7 billion benefit to the nation's economy and supported 340,500 jobs. Visitor spending increased by \$800 million from 2018 to 2019 and the overall effect on the U.S. economy grew by \$1.6 billion. In the last five years, visitor spending has increased by \$4.1 billion and the effect on the U.S. economy grew by \$9.7 billion.

"We have been working to safely welcome the public back to their national parks and provide more service again," said Secretary Bernhardt. "These treasured places provide respite and recreation for the American people, in addition to vital economic support to gateway communities across the country. The tremendous value of our national parks is undeniable as is the need to adequately maintain them, which is why President Trump has called on Congress to address the decades of deferred maintenance."

According to the annual National Park Service report released today, 2019 National Park Visitor Spending Effects, more than 327 million visitors spent \$21 billion in communities within 60 miles of a park in the National Park System. Of the 340,500 jobs supported by visitor spending, more than 278,000 jobs exist in communities adjacent to parks. The report includes statistics by park and by state on visitor spending and the number of jobs supported by visitor spending.

"Safely increasing access to national parks and other public lands supports individual and collective physical and mental wellness, said National Park Service Deputy Director David Vela, exercising the authority of the Director. "It also benefits park gateway communities where millions of visitors each year find a place to sleep and eat, hire outfitters and guides and make use of other local services that help drive a vibrant tourism and outdoor recreation industry."

Lodging expenses account for the largest share of visitor spending totaling \$7.1 billion in 2019. The restaurant sector had the next greatest effects with \$4.2 billion

in economic output. Motor vehicle fuel expenditures were \$2.16 billion with retail spending at \$1.93 billion.

There are National Park System sites in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. Territories of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam. Visitation varies across the country from Grand Canyon National Park in Arizona to Grand Portage National Monument in Minnesota.

Last year, Grand Canyon National Park attracted nearly 6 million visitors who spent more than \$890 million, supporting 11,806 jobs and generating a \$1.1 billion total economic output. Grand Portage National Monument recorded approximately 94,985 recreation visitors who spent an estimated \$6,208,000. That spending supported 78 jobs and more than a \$6 million total economic output.

Experts in the fields of bead work, basketry, pottery, cultural items, jewelry, painting, rugs and blankets will be available for private consultations included

with the price of admission. Guests are encouraged to bring up to three items for review.

Red Earth has garnered numerous accolades through its 40-year history – setting the standard for many of today's Native art shows. Red Earth was a finalist for the 2018 ONE Award for the Arts presented by the Oklahoma Center for Non-Profits, and the Oklahoma Travel Industry Association has twice named Red Earth Oklahoma's Outstanding Event. A recent USA Today 10Best Reader's Poll named the Red Earth Festival one of the Top Ten Art Festivals in America.

From time to time, a question has been asked as to why the Sac and Fox Nation uses such a special exclusive (and longer) native sovereign nation dot gov Internet designation and name:

The "nsn dot gov" (nsn.gov) designation carries with it more significant levels of legitimacy, trust, and authority than a commercial, "dot com" domain name.

"NSN DOT GOV" confirms that it is an official government website that has been certified, verified, and recognized by the United States Government.

Of course, commercial sub-entities and public political subdivisions of tribal government may also use a commercial dot com designation for commercial-oriented purposes.



OMRF Believes Covid-19 Is 'Here for the Long Haul'

Chick n px Measles. HIV. Covid-19 Even after the p ndemic subsides, the coronavirus is likely to join the list of contagious diseases that remain in circulation for decades to come, according to health experts at the Ok ahoma Medical Research Foundation.

"It look like Covid-19 will be here for the long haul;" said OMRF President Stepe n Prescott, M.D. When illnesses stubbornly resist efforts to stamp them out, express rts call them endemic.

"An endemic is a virus that's always p esent, but not usually in huge outbreak. It comes and goes in waves and just becomes a p rt of life, like the seasonal flu," said OMRF physician-scientist Scofield, M.D., who also serves as associate chief of staff for research at the Ok ahoma City VA.

Multip e initiatives are work ng toward the development of a vaccine for the SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus. But even if these efforts succeed, unless nearly everyone gets vaccinated, they won't eliminate the virus.

"I'm sk p ical a Covid-19 vaccine will wip out the virus," he said. "We have highly effective vaccines for pe umococcal pe umonia, but only about 2 of every 3 adults have received even one. As a result, pneumococcal pe umonia is still respn sible for roughly half of all pe umonia deaths in the U.S. every year."

A survey of Ok ahomans earlier this month from Amber Integrated found that only 5 p rcent of those pl led would get a vaccine against the coronavirus if one became available. Similarly, a pl 1 by The Washington Post found that only 7 in 10 Americans were interested in getting vaccinated.

"Even if it p oves safe and effective, you will still have many Americans who don't vaccinate because they don't believe in it or don't trust a new vaccine," Scofield said. "And that will keep the virus around."

Outside the U.S., esp cially in developing comp nies, access to the vaccine could also be a major issue. For ex mp e, with pe umococcal pe umonia, nearly children under the age of 5 die every year from what Scofield describes as a "nearly comp etely p eventable disease."

The effects of SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus will like ly grow milder over time, said Prescott. "Our immune systems should develop 'memories' of the virus that will blunt or eliminate future infections," he said. "It's also ps sible the virus itself will mutate to a less lethal form, which is more advantageous from an evolutionary

A Letter to the Editor:

Tribal members, there is an immediate need to address concerns that our Business Committee has inherited due to p st misstep by p evious Business Committees. A committee of tribal members needs to be formed to look into issues and p st p actices that the Business Committee is basing current tribal business decisions on. The following are actions that have occurred without discussion or kow ledge of the Governing Council:

- 1. An Attorney General's Op nion (not a law) that says that a Business Committee Resolution can erase or amend any Governing Council Resolution:
- 2 An Attorney General's Op nion that take s control of casinos and economic develom ent away from the Enterp ise Board, which was directly overseen by Governing Council, and gives it to the Business Committee;
- 3 Businesses created and bought and financed without prior knowledge or app oval by Governing Council (the Enterp ise Board is the economic development arm of the Sac and FoxN ation);
- 4 A tribal member illegally banned from the Black Hawk Casino, and no investigation;
- 5 Interference by a Business Committee member in a casino jackt with no investigation;
- 6 Enterp ise Board legal defense, as p ovided according the Enterp ise Act, denied to a member of the Enterp ise

7 The Sac and Fox Gaming Commission holding an illegal "Closed and Confidential Hearing" (where no confidential information was p esented) and refusing to send Hearing records to the Hearing individual for ap al pr ps es or to the Nation's secretary, the ke ep r of all tribal

These are p st actions and inactions that set a p ecedence that our Business Committee may continue to use in making decisions that diminish the welfare and rights of all the Sac and Fox p ob e. The objective of a committee of tribal api nted members is to gather and **p** ss detailed information on tribal concerns, and p ep re for Governing Council meetings where any misstep by p st or p esent Business committees can be corrected by a vote of the Governing Council. In reference to items 1. and 7 above, these are challenges to our Constitution which states: Article III, Section 1. (c), "The Secretary...shall have all a p rs of the Governing Council, which records and p p rs shall be op n to insp ction... by any members of the Governing Council desiring to read them." And, Article II, Section 1, "The Sup eme Governing body of the Sac and Fox Nation shall be the Governing Council..."

- Once a W-9 form is receive d, it will be updated into our system and all payments due will be made at a time of disbursement.
- If an indiv dual is a NEW tribal member, or has had a NAME CHANGE, a copy of Social Security card is needed for our records.
- There is NO deadline on submitting a W9. All checks will be mailed, no exe ptions.

W-9 Form

It is critical that the W-9 Form be completed correctly and thoroughly for each individual tribal member. Be sure to fill out your NAME, MAIL-ING ADDRESS, SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER, and then SIGN and DATE your form.

Required Legal Documents

If you have had a name change due to marriage, divorce, adoption, etc., it is important the Finance Department has a copy of your social security card. All othere legal documents should be sent to the Enrollment Department so their records can be updated. Any guardianship or Power of Attorney documents need to be on file with the Finance Department.

<u>Minors</u>

Parents or guardians are responsible for providing a W-9 for minor children; not doing so could result in the minor's payment not being deposited into the minor's trust fund account in a timely manner.

Tax Liability Notification

What are the withholding requirements for distributions that are made per a Revenue Allocation Plan (RAP)? The first step is to identify the source of funds used for the distribution. Unless the source of funds is specifically exempt from taxation, the amounts that make up the distributions to tribal members are taxable.

Which funds get reported on Form 1099-Misc? Distributions could be derived from many sources, including the profits from a tribal business other than a Class II or Class III gaming operation, interest income on investments, or rental payments from tribal lands. All these payments require a tribe to prepare a Form 1099-MISC

When does a person receive a Form 1099-Misc, Statement for Recipients of Miscellaneous Income? If a person receives \$600 or more in 1 calendar year from the same source, that amount must be reported on a Form 1099, and that Form 1099-Misc. must be provided to the individual.

It is only the amount distributed from NET GAMING REVENUE that is subject to withholding. The Internal Revenue Code provides that "Every person, including an Indian tribe, making a payment to a member of an Indian tribe from the net revenues of any Class II or Class III gaming activity conducted or licensed by such tribe, shall deduct and withhold from such payment a tax in an amount equal to such payment's proportionate share of the annualized tax." The amount to withhold is provided in Withholding Tables found in IRS Publication 15-A, Employer's Supplemental Tax Guide.

If the Indian tribe anticipates making a distribution of any kind, the Indian tribe needs the tribal members' Social Security number before the distribution is made. If an Indian tribe does not know a tribal member's Social Security number at the time of distribution, the distribution is subject to "backup withholding" (at 28% in 2009). (Source: Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Indian Tribal Governments Frequently Asked Questions, Last Reviewed or Updated: April 22, 2013)

Per capita payments could affect any Tribal, Federal, State, and/or Local benefits you may receive or programs in which you participate. The Sac and Fox Nation encourage you to check with your tax accountant or benefit specialist.


Why does a W-9 needed to be submitted yearly?

If a tribal member receives income that is taxable, a 1099 must be issued for Tax Purposes. The W-9 also serves as a yearly address update.

Can the allotted minor payment be refused in order to have the entire per capita payment be deposited in trust? Yes, but in order to do so we must still receive a W-9 for the same reasons stated above. We would also need a written statement to that effect to be included with the W-9.

Tribal Members Urged to Participate in 2020 U. S. Census

Sac and Fox Nation Secretary Jack yn King continues to emha size the impr tance for all tribal members to p rticip te in the 20 U. S. Census as information that is gathered imp cts federal funding for various tribal p ograms.

Following is census information p ovided by the Native American Rights Fund (NARF), the oldest, largest non-

profit legal organization defending the rights of Native American tribes, organizations,a nd p ob e:

the U.S. Census Bu-On Ap il 1, **Q** reau will conduct a count of all p ob e living in the United States and the Tribal Nations in the United States.

Alaska Natives are among the first Americans being counted, beginning in January, with the Nunak uyarmiut Tribe (formerly kn own as the Native Village of Tok ook Bay) in Alask . The Census is being taken in Alaska earlier than elsewhere because many villages are in remote areas and residents often leave their communities in Ap il for subsistence fishing and hunting and

warm-weather jobs. •NATIVES NEED TO BE COUNTED TO SECURE FEDERAL DOLLARS: About 6 billion in federal funding is distributed annually based on ppl ation counts obtained by federal agencies. Each person counted equals \$3,000 in funding for your community.

A year 0 study determined that under-counting the largest counties in the Census cost those communities nearly \$3,000 per person. Dollars that imp ct tribal communities are lost if you are not counted.

In 2016, federal funding disbursed based on p ob e counted in Census surveys included \$361 billion for Medicaid, \$40 billion for roads, and about \$37 billion in p ograms for families and children, including TANF, CHIP, and WIC.

• NATIVES NEED TO BE COUNT-ED TO PROTECT TRIBAL SOVER-EIGNTY: The Census count is used to

determine voting boundaries to elect officials in non-Tribal elections. You need to be counted to have an equal voice to elect candidates who will resp ct Tribal sovereignty, p eserve your culture, and fairly allocate resources to Indian Country.

• NATIVES NEED TO BE COUNTED TO PRESERVE THEIR LANGUAGES: Census data is used to require non-Tribal governments in many areas to p ovide assistance in American Indian and Alask Native languages for voting, social p ograms, and emergency services.

The decennial census is the most inclusive civic activity in our country, covering every p rson in every household. The U.S. Constitution requires an accurate count of the nation's ppl ation every 10 years. Moreover, the census is integral to our democracy. The data collected affects our nation's ability to ensure equal representation and equal access to impr tant governmental and p ivate sector resources for all Americans, including across racial and ethnic lines.

Census results are used to allocate seats and draw district lines for the U.S. House of Rep esentatives, state legislatures, and local boards; to target more billion annually in federal assistance to states, localities, and families; and to guide community decision-making affecting schools, housing, health care services, business investment, and much more. These functions dep nd on a fair and accurate census.
